GreenHill Center for NC Art in Greensboro, NC, Celebrates the **Art of Puppetry**

GreenHill Center for NC Art in Greensboro, NC, will present, Of Wings and Feet: The World of PAPERHAND and Jeghetto's Moving Sculptures, on view from Mar. 22 through June 21, 2025.

GreenHill's spring exhibition celebrates the art of puppetry. Meet the makers and discover large and small-scale puppets by PAPERHAND, the Graham, NC-based collective co-directed by Donovan Zimmerman and Jan Burger now in their 25th year as well as works by Tarish Pipkins of Jeghetto's puppets. Free and open to the public.

In 1998, Paperhand Puppet Intervention's directors Donovan Zimmerman and Jan Burger met and began a collaboration of epic proportions. Since then, 25 years ago, they have been using papier-mâché, cardboard, bamboo, your old house paints, cloth, and other assorted junk to create incredible giant puppets, masks, shadow plays and spectacle performances for all ages

They continue to tell stories, beat drums, sew cloth, get sweaty, push boundaries and carry heavy things to help make the world a better place. Paperhand's parades, pageants, and award winning performances aim to be an inspiration, a call to action, and a celebration for everyone to enjoy.

"Paperhand Puppet Project's mission is to create art that inspires connection. By practicing, performing and teaching the art of puppetry, we strive to nurture the best in humanity, build creative culture, and help celebrate and protect the natural world," says Zimmerman and Burger. They go on to say, "Our vision is inspired by our love for the earth and its creatures (including humans). We will synthesize many art forms including, but never limited to, sculpting, painting, dance, music,

improvisation, costume design, set design and theater. We are committed to creating multi-scaled and multi-disciplinary puppet performances that support this vision.'

We will use this puppetry, performance and creativity to undermine and eradicate greed, hate and fear and promote justice, equality and peace. We will work uncompromisingly to these ends."

In accompaniment with Of Wings and Feet, GreenHill presents a special showcase of work by renowned puppeteer and artist Tarish Pipkins, aka Jeghetto. A self-taught master builder, Jeghetto creates abstract, moving sculptures from found and recycled materials. His visionary puppetry has earned recognition from the Jim Henson Foundation and collaborations with artists like Missy Elliott, Pharrell Williams, and PAPERHAND Puppet Project. This additional exhibition features several of his dynamic works, offering a glimpse into his unique craftsmanship and storytelling.

Programming for this exhibition includes a PAPERHAND participatory parade in celebration of Earth Day at South Lawn in LeBauer Park on April 19; an artist talk with Donovan Zimmerman on May 14, where he will share insights into PAPER-HAND's creative process and communitydriven work; and Jeghetto's Workshop on June 7, a family-friendly puppet show with Tarish Pipkins of Jeghetto Puppets, followed by a conversation with the artist. 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intimate partner violence in their lifetime, making this exhibition's message of healing and resilience particularly vital to our community.

Elizabeth Foley says, REBIRTH brings together a powerful collection of artworks that challenge traditional narratives about domestic violence. The exhibition prominently features Foley's own work, including new pieces from her "Finding Wings" collection - a series of ceramic swan-inspired sculptures that incorporate survivors' stories within their forms. Additionally, the show includes works form artists across the United States working across various mediums including sculpture, painting, and mixed media.

"I want this work to inspire more conversation about domestic violence," says Foley. "It's important to show myself and others that we don't need to hide this part of who we are."

The exhibition features deeply personal works from participating artists, each piece reflecting the journey from trauma to healing. Featured artist Natalie Robinson reflects on her contribution, "This work captures the mental toll such an experience can take, and reflects the resilience needed to reject the harmful words and negativity that once sought to define me." Artist Sage Adderley adds, "Sharing my painting, Seeds of Survival, is my way of

breaking the silence, challenging misconceptions about survivors, and finding power in the vulnerability of healing."

A portion of all art sales will support YVEDDI, a local nonprofit providing vital services to survivors of domestic violence in Davie, Stokes, Surry, and Yadkin Counties. This collaboration underscores the exhibition's commitment to creating tangible support for survivors while raising awareness through art.

Elizabeth Foley is a multi-passionate artist, author, and creativity coach based in Asheville, NC. As an artist working for social change, Foley's artistic practice is deeply rooted in the belief that creativity can transmute pain into healing. Her passion for art drives her to create work that not only beautifies but also catalyzes important conversations about social issues. While she works across multiple mediums, her first creative love is ceramics. "I love being able to take a humble lump of clay and turn it into something marvelous," Foley says.

With over 25 years of creative experience, including studies at the University of
