In the late nore than 30 Medellin, Colombia, then the most vital textile region in Latin America, arrived in Greenville, recruited by the mills for their expertise as machine operators and loom technicians. Not part of the existing social fabric, these families were separated from home for years, the women working tirelessly 12 hours a day, six days a week in social isolation compounded by language barriers and racism. These Latino women wove not only cotton, but also nests from w hich they raised their families and made new lives as the city flourished and prospered until the day when the thread was snipped, and the cotton textile industry died out.
